

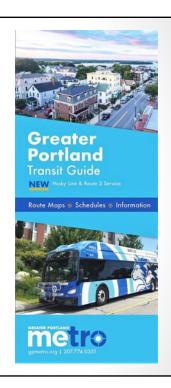

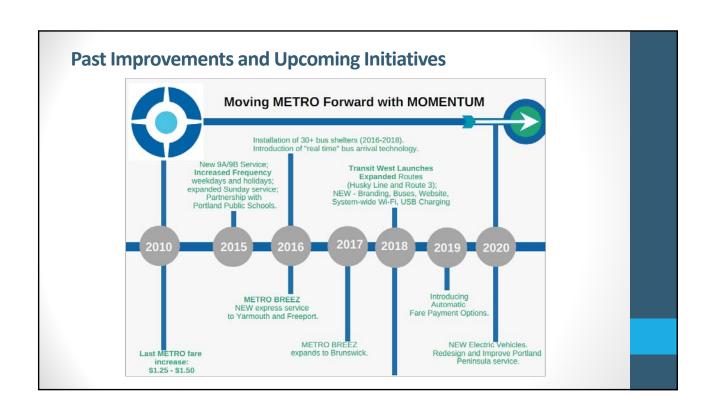


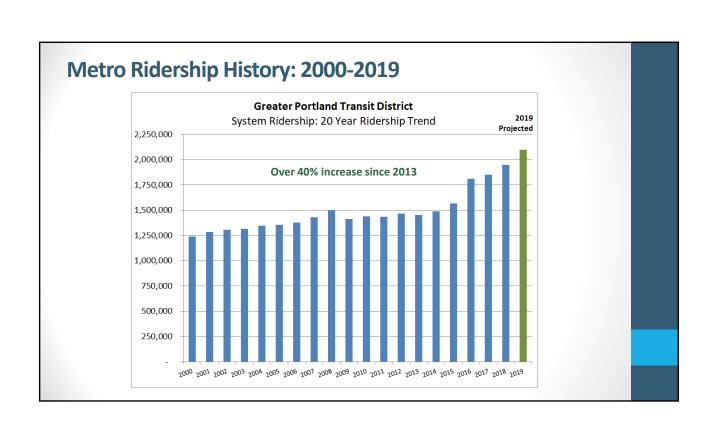


METRO OVERVIEW

- Formed in 1966
- Largest of seven (7) regional transportation agencies.
- Ten (10) bus routes serving eight (8) municipalities: Brunswick, Falmouth, Freeport, Gorham, Portland, South Portland, Westbrook and Yarmouth.
- Board of Directors includes: Falmouth, Portland and Westbrook (Brunswick, Freeport and Yarmouth joining in January 2020.
- 44 CNG and Diesel powered buses.
- Over 100 employees.
- Projecting over 2.1 million annual boardings in 2019
- Ridership per capita is over 16.







Transit Service in Falmouth

LOCAL BUS ROUTE 7 (Falmouth and Portland)

Service Levels:

- Mon-Sat: Every 60 minutes from 6:30 a.m.-7:00 p.m.
- Sun: Every 60 minutes from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Major Destinations:

- Falmouth Village (primary northern terminus)
- Downtown Portland (southern terminus)
- Martin's Point Healthcare
- Ocean View Community
- Town Landing and Falmouth Foreside

• Connections:

- Direct connections with all Metro routes in downtown Portland
- Connections to South Portland Bus Service and Shuttlebus-Zoom.

LOCAL BUS ROUTE 9 (Falmouth and Portland)

Falmouth Service Levels:

- Mon-Fri: Intermittent from 6:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.
- Sat: Every 60 minutes from 8:30 a.m. to 8:30 p.m.
- Sun: Every 60 minutes from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.
- Higher service levels in Portland.

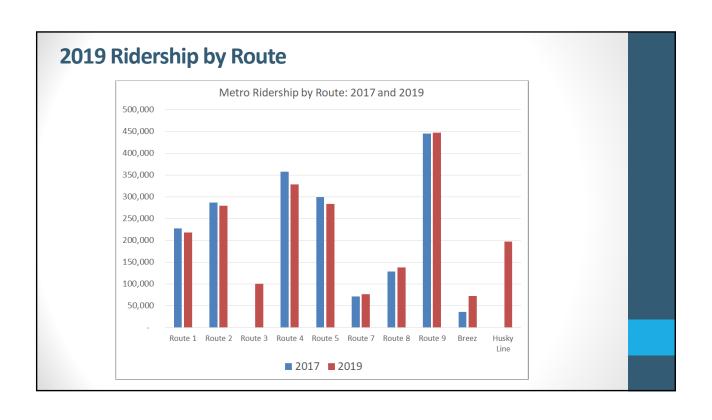

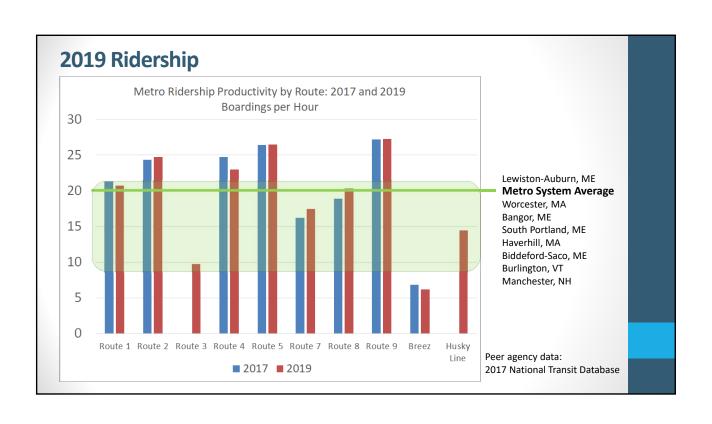
- West Falmouth Hannaford and TD Bank Plazas

- Congress Street Corridor

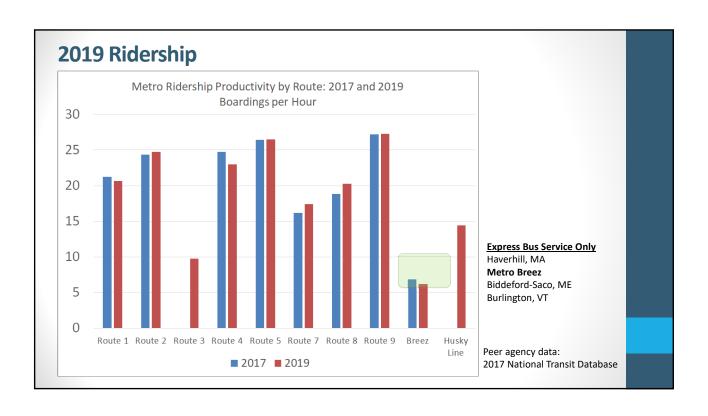

UPCOMING PROJECTS

Automated Fare Payment & Fare Increase

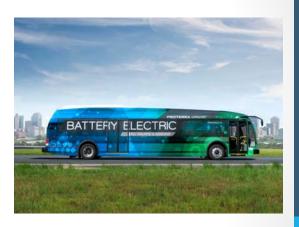
- Four (4) transit agencies.
- Local fare goes from \$1.50 to \$2.00.
- Breez fare goes from \$3.00 to \$4.00
- Introduce mobile app.
- Introduce stored value smart card with wide retail network.
- Eliminate all paper based tickets and passes.
- Roll-out fare capping in place of period passes.
- Cash will still be accepted.
- March 2020 implementation.





UPCOMING PROJECTS

- Battery Electric Bus Project 2021
 Deployment of 2 buses.
- Pathway to Zero Emissions by 2040.
- Partnership with Shuttlebus-Zoom,
 Maine Department of Transportation,
 Center for Transportation and the
 Environment (CTE) and Proterra.
- \$2.3 million from FTA low-No Emissions Grant Program.
- \$3.0 million from Maine's VW Settlement Fund.

2020 Budget Summary

- No major service changes: minor changes to Husky Line and Route 4.
- Automated fare collection deployment.
- Estimated total budget increase is 6.6% -
 - Major expenditure drivers include:
 - Increases in wages-benefits, new vendor fees and addition to 2 full-time positions.
 - Decreases in fuel, parts expense and capital program.
 - Major revenue drivers include:
 - Increases due to planned fare increase, revenue from vehicle advertising and higher local contributions from Brunswick, Freeport and Yarmouth
 - Decreases related to phase-out of start-up grant funding for the Metro Breez and <u>potentially</u> insufficient recurring federal operating support. Budget assumes \$513,000 in additional federal funding support to be secured over coming months.
 - Base local assessment: 3.6% increase overall (excluding new towns).

Metro Budget Process

- October Board approves preliminary budget and formula for allocating local contributions.
- November 30 day statutory review period for member municipalities.
- January-February Federal funding appropriations and apportionment contingent on Congress passing budget.
- February-April PACTS process for allocating federal funding to transit agencies.
- February Metro Board approves final budget.
- March Warrants for taxes issued to member municipalities.
- July Member municipality assessments due to Metro.
