Despite Massive Support for Solar Energy Bill LePage's Veto Stands as GOP Abandons Clean Energy Jobs in Maine—the vote was 93-50, short of the two-thirds needed to override the veto. LD 1649, An Act to Modernize Maine's Solar Power Policy and Encourage Economic Development, is now dead. "This is an extremely disappointing moment for solar power in Maine." said Dylan Voorhees, Clean Energy Director for the Natural Resources Council of Maine. "It took years of hard work to hash out this broadly-supported solar policy that works for Maine. I'm so proud that Maine people, businesses, towns, and others stood up together to call for Maine to get out of last place on solar and reap the jobs, lower cost electricity, and pollution reductions it brings. - ...that the dryer is the third biggest energy draining appliance? A great alternative is <u>drying your laundry outdoors</u> or even air drying right in your laundry room on a rack, or hanging clothes up on hangers.
- ...Maine produces more electricity per capita from hydropower than any other state east of the Mississippi River?
- ...Maine has the highest per capita generation of electricity from biomass in the United States?
- ...Maine is the most petroleum dependent state for home heating, with the highest per capita consumption of heating oil in 2012?
- ...Maine homeowners pay more per month on heating oil than any other energy expense?
- ... Maine pays a higher percent of its GDP on residential energy than any state in the country?
- ...Maine is one of only three states where the industrial sector uses more than 30% of the state's energy, yet the industrial rate is well above the nation average?
- ...that due to regional pipeline capacity constraints, above market natural gas prices cost Maine ratepayers at least \$120 million and New England ratepayers at least \$1.4 billion in 2013 alone?

Duties shall include but not be limited to the following: (1) Endeavor to save local taxpayer dollars through increased energy-efficiency of municipal facilities and operations; (2) Prioritize the ad hoc Falmouth Green Ribbon Committee's 2010 recommendations that the Council wants to pursue; (3) Educate Falmouth residents and businesses about energy-efficient, waste-reducing, clean energy opportunities and choices; (4) Enhance and promote the town's recycling program; (5) Promote the use of clean, renewable energy sources in Falmouth's public and private facilities through education and outreach; (6) Work with surrounding communities on potential regional energy efficiency and clean energy strategies; (7) Monitor new developments and options in the fields of energy and waste management as technologies evolve and change; educate the public and advise the Council on same; (8) Research and report policies to accomplish the above goals and/or other related goals deemed appropriate by the Town Council.
