

Q2 In what age bracket are you and all other people in your household?






Q5 How do you stay informed on town matters? Check all that apply.







2	1. I haven't lived here the whole time since 2006; my answers are based on what I've seen when we arrived in 2013, and what's occurred since then. 2. I have ongoing concerns about trail erosion in popular areas. Erosion has been considerable, even in the short time I've lived here. This is especially true for mountain bike trails, and particularly those frequented by large, out-of-town riding groups organized by area bike shops. That said, I am also a mountain biker, a customer of these bike shops, and a Falmouth resident who uses trails in other towns. I contribute to our erosion problem, and I'm not looking to restrict access. Nonetheless, erosion is a problem, and one that we don't seem to be taking adequate steps to mitigate as a town. While rooty, rocky trails may be a minor inconvenience (or even a welcome challenge) for advanced riders, they are dangerous to those on foot (particularly trail runners) and definitely limit the degree to which my younger / less experienced family members ride our trails.	10/26/2017 3:58 PM

Q9 What could the Town have done better in the last decade regarding any of the above goals?


